Chief Walsh Announces Retirement Sergeant Michael Coen Promoted to Chief of Old Brookville Police Department

The Village Board of Trustees is pleased to announce that Sergeant Michael Coen has been selected as the new Chief of Police. He succeeds Christopher J. Walsh, who announced that he will retire from the Department as of September 30.

Sergeant Coen joined the Old Brookville Police Department in 2010 after serving 10 years with the New York Police Department and has been Chief Walsh's Deputy Commanding Officer during the past year.

His background also includes attending the NYPD Police Academy in Manhattan and the Nassau Police Department Supervisory School. He graduated from Fordham University with a Bachelor's Degree in Economics.

Chief Walsh served with the Old Brookville Police Department for 35 years. He was promoted to Sergeant in 1999, Lieutenant in 2013, and Chief of Police in 2019.

With Sergeant Coen's promotion to Chief of Police, Officer Joseph Martino has been promoted to Sergeant as of September 1st.

License Plate Readers Deter Crime in Old Brookville

In addition to the two mobile License Plate Readers, and a third on order, the Old Brookville Police Department currently utilizes six fixed LPR cameras that have recently been installed throughout the Village. These cameras were part of a larger New York State \$100,000 grant that Old Brookville and surrounding jurisdictions, including Brookville and Muttontown/Upper Brookville, partnered in. These cameras are web-based and read the license plates of vehicles that pass. An officer on patrol is alerted if that plate is suspended, stolen, a suspect in criminal activity, or linked to a missing person. Alerts are received on the laptops in the police car or on a cell phone. Local jurisdictions have the ability to share the alerts and enter the suspect's plate information into a hot list to advise if a vehicle wanted in

connection with burglaries or stolen vehicles enters an area.

If a crime does occur, detectives are able to view the cameras to ascertain if any unknown vehicles were in the area at the time of the occurrence to assist with the investigation and possible apprehension.



Police Department Retirements

Police Officer Robert Alvino retired from the Old Brookville Police Department on February 28, 2023. Unfortunately, Officer Alvino's career was cut short due to an on-duty auto accident, suffering injuries that precluded him from returning to active duty. During his career, he was not only a decorated active Police Officer, he played a prominent role in the Police Benevolent Association retiring as the PBA president. Prior to his career in law enforcement, Robert attended Ohio Wesleyan University excelling on the men's lacrosse team and earning his bachelor's degree in education.

Sgt. Thomas Fellner retired from the Old Brookville Police Department on January 31, 2024. Tom joined the OBPD in 1991 and enjoyed a 31-plus-year career, rising to the rank of Sergeant in 2016. During his career, he earned numerous awards for the department and was assigned as the training Sergeant keeping all the New York State certifications for every officer up to date.

Sgt. Michael Butler retired from the Old Brookville Police Department on July 25, 2024 after a 32-year career with OBPD. Mike was a member of the Nassau County Sheriff's Department prior to joining Old Brookville in 1992. He was promoted to the rank of Sergeant in April 2017. During his career, Sgt. Butler earned numerous awards for his actions while on duty.

All three members were integral in the smooth day-to-day operations of the department and their contributions will not be forgotten.

MESSAGE FROM THE MAYOR

Fall 2024

Dear Residents:

It has been a little over two years since the Old Brookville Police Department (OBPD) transitioned from a six-village police department to a one-village force exclusively serving the residents of Old Brookville. During this time, the Department experienced four retirements (including one impending disability) and four new hires. Now, with Chief Walsh announcing his retirement effective September 30th, the OBPD will begin a new chapter under the leadership of future Chief of Police Michael Coen.

On behalf of the Board of Trustees and all Old Brookville residents, I would like to express my deep appreciation for the 35 years of service that Chief Walsh has provided to the OBPD. His experience and his leadership were key in ensuring a smooth transition to a one-village police force as of June 1, 2022. For the past two-plus years, the Chief and I have worked closely to ensure that our officers have the latest technology, a modern fleet and the training necessary for the OBPD to be an effective and efficient police force. Chief Walsh will be missed, but he will not be forgotten and will continue to serve as a part-time consultant to the OBPD.

Looking to the future, the Board of Trustees and I decided several months ago that an internal promotion for Sergeant Michael Coen to become the next Chief of the Department was the best decision for the OBPD and for our community. Sergeant Coen has had prior experience with the New York City Police Department and now, under the direction of Chief Walsh, is being prepared to lead the OBPD as of September 30th. Please join me in wishing Sergeant Coen much success in his new position.

During the past two years, OBPD retirements and subsequent hires have right-sized the Department's hierarchy to include a Chief, four sergeants and nine officers. This compares to six sergeants and seven officers as of June 2022. Another retirement or two may be forthcoming in the coming months, resulting in the continuing evolvement of the OBPD in becoming a younger force. That said, our Village police will continue to employ an ideal mix of veteran and younger officers to serve the needs of our community. I and the Village trustees look forward to the many years of anticipated service from our new officers.

The enhanced security provided for our Village has come at an increased cost. However, I am pleased to announce that the Village's \$5 million bond used for resurfacing our roads and improving our drainage infrastructure will be completely paid off this month. The Village's remaining debt will then be at its lowest level in many years.

Thank you as always for your support. On behalf of the Board of Trustees, it is our privilege to volunteer our time for the benefit of the Village of Old Brookville.
